As you may remember, Denise and Jean worked with Renee Mask at the Township Office to apply for a grant for a Seniors Active Living Centre. We (the Township of Greater Madawaska) were successful in receiving a grant and now have a new part-time position in the Township Office, Caitlin Norton, who is responsible for the SALC activities. SALC programs target 55+ members of our community, many of whom are not Club 55+ members. Some are shut ins and have health issues. SALC funding can target these members as well as collaborating with us for other

activities. Caitlin planned two trips this year: one to the Tulip Festival and one to view the autumn leaves with lunch in Deep River. These outings included SALC members from Dacre and Griffin. We encourage all of our members to become SALC members. There is no cost. There has been some confusion as we are called Calabogie 55+ Club and SALC was registered as Greater Madawaska Club 55+. There are opportunities for our Club to receive funding for activities if we offer the activity across the Township. Something to consider for our hikes and road trips.

I also thank Dave Abraham for providing a new platform and features for our new website and thanks to Rick Brown for his ongoing support with our previously outdated, unsupported and unfriendly website. Rick will continue on as photographer and you will see many of his photos on our site.

55+ Club Bowling League for 2025

The 2024/2025 bowling season officially ended on April 15, 2025. However, since the weather was cooperative (i.e. not too hot, or cold), many of our bowlers continued for an additional 2 weeks with Bingo Bowling – a fast-paced, think on your feet, game, that many love to play.

The current 2025/2026 bowling season started in mid-September.

We continue to gather on Tuesday mornings at the Opeongo Bowl Drome in Renfrew. Our purpose is to get together to have fun, socialize, meet new friends, and also (incidentally) to get a little exercise. We managed to get a couple of more bowlers signed up from the Calabogie 55+ Club – but would still love to see more of you (Remember this for next September!). 55+ Club members are given priority to be regulars on teams.

There was a good show of interest from both past bowlers, and newly interested bowlers – some of whom were new to bowling, and some who hadn't bowled in many (many, many) years. We

managed to almost fill 6 teams with regular bowlers; as well as enough spares to fill in for absentees when needed. (Due to various reasons, there always seems to be a few that can't make it on a particular date.)

After the Christmas break, we started back on January 6th. Regular bowling will continue for 2026 until April 14th. I'm sure that a couple of more weeks will follow with more Bingo Bowling games – many are really keen on these “competitions”, but all in the name of having fun.

6) Website – Dave Abraham

7) Ontario Senior Games Liaison – Denise Lavallee/Val Trotter

The Ontario Senior Games held their annual summer games in and around Renfrew County in the months of May and June. We are in District 5 and our district extends from Arnprior to Deep River, Wilno/Barry's Bay, etc. These games are available for anyone who resides in Ontario and are over the age of 55. Several of our club members participated in two district games held in Calabogie, Renfrew and Eganville. Our first game was the prediction walk, both Nordic and regular prediction walks, both Nordic and simple walking where participants are not judged on the fastest time walked but on how well you predict the amount of time it will take you to walk either a 1.5 km or a 3 km walk. The route was established years ago in downtown Calabogie (Strachan, Larabie and Hutchinson). Ten people from district 5 came out on a wet and rainy May 23rd morning to walk, (actually run) in this activity. Several winners were from Calabogie Club 55+, namely Anne Hutchinson, Linda Cloutier, Jane Benoit, Donna Kearns and Val Trotter. Denise Lavallée was the OSGA convenor for this event.

Note: The Prediction Walking Games will be held again in Calabogie but will be later in May or early June 2026, in order to avoid the bugs.

Denise also convened the bowling games at Opeongo Bowldrome in Renfrew earlier in May. There were no participants from our Club at that event.

At the end of May, golf was once again a popular senior game that many from Calabogie participated in at Whitetail Golf Course. There were seventeen (17) club members who played in this golf game out of a total of 45 participants. Winners from Calabogie Club 55+ were Marjorie Watts, Vicky Chantler, Jane Benoit (75+); Sue Beaton, Susan Veale (65+); Alyson Gaffney (55+) with several other residents from Calabogie. These games use the callaway scoring system thus allowing a recreational golfer an opportunity to get a medal as a handicap is not needed. Val Trotter, assisted by Lori Armour were the OSGA convenors for this event.

Note: The Golf Senior Games in 2026 will again be held at Whitetail on Wednesday May 27th. Mark it on your calendar!!!

Other games took place in (Arnprior), Cobden, Chalk River, Deep River, and Pembroke. Pickleball, another popular sport, was moved to Deep River this past summer as the Nick Smith Arena in Arnprior was undergoing renovation. We are looking at bringing it back to Arnprior in 2026.

Now onto the winter games. These games are not as popular at the moment and is typically snow dependent and we are in need of convenors. Last year we brought back curling to the area/district after many years of it not happening. We are holding it again this year on Nov 1 at the Renfrew Curling Club and have a full house, i.e. 8 teams. Two of the teams are from our neighboring district 6 (Ottawa) as they do not have an active district, and as such they are able to join us for this year. We have over 16 people from the club 55 participating in this fun filled event. It is a mixed event, but as we are still trying to get participants and interest, we are being lenient and allowing for either a 3 ladies team with one man, or an all-women's team, competing for the coveted gold medal. Winners and I believe all participants will be eligible to go to the Provincial games in Huntsville in February 2026. Hopefully the weather will cooperate.

The next event will be in Calabogie at St. Andrews UC. It is mixed contract bridge. As of Wednesday, Oct. 29th, we have five tables already confirmed. You must sign up with a partner and play with said partner for the entire duration. This too, is a full house and is the first time district 5 (OSGA) is holding their winter contract bridge tournament/competition.

I, along with my side-kick, Lori Armour are convening the curling and Denise Lavallee is convening the bridge event on Tuesday, November 4th.

If you are an avid badminton enthusiast then you can also go to Petawawa on December 12 (Friday) to join this senior games event. It will be held at the Garrison Petawawa Badminton club for only \$3 participation fee.

8) Mixed Summer Bridge -Val Trotter

Mixed Bridge was again held from May through September at Barnet Cottage. As in past years, we have an active group of card players within our Club. Our spring/summer bridge is held once a month on a Tuesday afternoon from 1:30 to 4:30 pm. Dates in 2025 were May 13th, June 10th, July 15th, August 12th and September 9th.
